CLERGY VOICE

Dear Friends.

Chanukah is the holiday that asks: are we Light Keepers or Light Kindlers? The sages of the Talmud debate this very question. What is the main mitzvah of Chanukah, they ask? Is it the kindling of the lights of the Chanukah menorah or is it placing the Menorah in a window or doorway where its lights can be seen by the public? After much discussion, the sages agreed unanimously that illuminating the lights of Chanukah, lighting the menorah, is the essential element of the Chanukah commandment.

For me, this debate makes a distinction between initiating the commandment or perpetuating the commandment. I have always been taught that as a Jew in the world, our job is to initiate light-not to wait for others but to feel the responsibility to begin good works even in the face of a complicated situation. It is up to us to make a difference, not just perpetuate what exists.

I believe that is the reason why Jews account for 22% of all individual recipients worldwide who have received the Nobel Peace Prize between 1901-2022 and constitute 36% of all US recipients. While our population in the world is at 0.2%, these are statistics that reveal the immense responsibility we have as a community to make the world a better place.

Here at Temple Israel, we feel responsible to inspire one another to work hard and to feel proud of being a Jew and being the light bearers of our legacy and history. That is why this Thanksgiving we are working throughout the week to feed the hungry, provide shelter for the homeless, and live our Jewish values through study, worship, and social justice. Join us as we work our way through the Thanksgiving To-Dah List the week of Thanksgiving.

On the Sunday before Chanukah, we will illuminate and animate our desire to kindle lights through a concert with a popular a cappella group, Six13. It will bring great joy to our JEWL learners

and their families as well as our greater

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THANKSGIVING & JUDAISM

As we look forward to Thanksgiving and all of the activities that are happening at Temple, we invite you to join us. In addition, we want to share some ways in which we might reflect on giving thanks and Jewish blessings.

From the biblical Psalmist to the marketplace in Tel Aviv, the word—תודה—todah—thanks is across our tradition. The first word that the prayerbook suggests we utter each morning is modeh or modah-the same root as todah, just changing the first letter. "Modeh Ani Lefanecha..." I am grateful before You, we say out loud, thankful to God for restoring our souls to our bodies, for living to see another day.

Jewish tradition enjoins us to say 100 blessings per day, to stop 100 times and notice something and express our gratitude for it. From blessings after using the restroom and before the food we eat, to blessings for other pleasant experiences, natural phenomena, annual occurrences, or unique experiences, the tradition is filled with these blessings. The litany of morning blessings that our prayerbook calls "Nissim Bechol Yom," miracles of each day, expresses thanksgiving for anything from the ability to discern day from night to gratitude for our freedom, for our senses, and for physical strength and spiritual strength. Whether you use the words of the prayerbook below or your own words of gratitude, here are some opportunities to take a moment to express thanksgiving:

Blessing recited when enjoying the smell of fruit:

בַּרוּך אַתַּה יִיַ אֵלֹהֵינוּ מֵלֶךְ הַעוֹלֶם, הַנּוֹתֶן רֵיחַ טוֹב בַּפָּרוֹת. Baruch atah Adonai eloheinu melech ha-olam, ha-notein re'ach tov ba'peirot.

Blessed are You, Eternal our God, Sovereign of all worlds, Who gives a beautiful aroma to fruit.

Blessing recited upon seeing natural phenomena such as lightning, tall mountains, and giant rivers:

בַרוּך אַתַּה יַיַ אַלהַינוּ מֵלֶך הַעוֹלָם, עוֹשֵה מַעֲשֵה בַראשִית. Baruch atah Adonai eloheinu melech ha-olam, oseh ma-aseih

Blessed are You, Eternal our God, Sovereign of all worlds, Who continuously does the work of creation.

Blessing recited upon hearing thunder:

בַּרוּךְ אַתַּה יִי אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֵלֶךְ הַעוֹלַם, שֶׁכֹּחוֹ וּגְבוּרַתוֹ מַלֵא עוֹלַם. Baruch atah Adonai eloheinu melech ha-olam, shekocho ug'vurato malei olam.

Blessed are You, Eternal our God, Sovereign of all worlds, Whose strength and might fill the universe.

Blessing recited upon seeing a rainbow:

בַּרוּך אַתַּה יַיַ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֵלֶךְ הַעוֹלַם, זוֹכֵר הַבִּרִית, וְנֵאֵמֵן בָּבְרִיתוֹ, וְקַיַּם בְּמַאֲמַרוֹ.

Baruch atah Adonai eloheinu melech ha-olam, zocheir hab'rit, v'ne-eman bivrito, v'kayam b'ma-amaro.

Blessed are You, Eternal our God, Sovereign of all worlds, Who remembers the covenant, is faithful to the covenant, and upholds commitments.

Blessing recited when seeing the most beautiful trees or animals:

בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יִיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֱלֶךְ הָעוֹלֶם, שֵׁכֵּכָה לוֹ בִּעוֹלֶמוֹ. Baruch atah Adonai eloheinu melech ha-olam, she'kacha lo b'olamo.

Blessed are You, Eternal our God, Sovereign of all worlds, Who has things like this in the universe.

Blessing recited when hearing good news. It is also customary to say it when having two kinds of wine in one sitting!

Blessing recited when hearing bad news:

בַּרוּךְ אַתָּה יִיָ אֵלֹהֵינוּ מֵלֶךְ הַעוֹלַם, דַיַּן הָאֵמֶת. Baruch atah Adonai eloheinu melech ha-olam, dayan ha-emet. Blessed are You, Eternal our God, Sovereign of all worlds, Who is the Judge of truth.

Blessing recited when seeing novel people or animals:





CHANUKAH CANDLE BLESSINGS

Light the first candle on Sunday evening, December 18.

Chanukah, meaning "dedication" in Hebrew, refers to the joyous eight-day celebration during which Jews commemorate the victory of the Maccabees over the Syrian Empire in 165 BCE and the subsequent liberation and rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem. The modern home celebration of Chanukah centers around the lighting of the Chanukiah, a special nine-branched menorah for Chanukah; foods prepared in oil including latkes (potato pancakes) and sufganiyot (jelly doughnuts); and special songs and games.



BETSY & STEVE SITKOFF

What do you think of when you think of Temple Israel? Longtime members Betsy and Steve Sitkoff describe it as "A happy place—one that has always filled us with warmth, love, and community."

It is that sense of warmth that led them to raise their children, Abbie and Lewis, here at Temple. They built community and connected through volunteering: Betsy joined the ECC Advisory Council, and Steve became a tutor through Temple's partnership with the former Jefferson School (now Ella Baker). Over the years, their family has also volunteered through Meals on Wheels and the Community Passover Seder.

Volunteer involvement and social justice are key values for the Sitkoffs, and ones that they feel has helped keep Temple Israel strong over the years. "We are so proud that Temple has committed to staying in the city, and that our clergy have always taken a stand on the most important issues of our time."

In addition to Temple's more public role, Betsy and Steve are grateful to Temple for always being there for them when they needed support and community. "We moved to Connecticut for a few years," Betsy remembers, "but Abbie just wanted to be part of Confirmation together with her Minneapolis friends. Temple let her come home to join the ceremony and be confirmed with her class. We truly appreciated that."

They also remember Temple being there for them during difficult times. Steve remembers the death of his father hitting him particularly hard. "I was having such a hard time moving past it. I was very close to my father," he reflects. "Rabbi Zimmerman came to our home and talked with me—it made such a difference. She is such a comforting presence." Betsy also recalls: "My sister passed away in her fifties from breast cancer. She hadn't been connected to the Jewish community for years, but during her

diagnosis, she wanted to return to it. Rabbi Zimmerman was there for her—it didn't matter that she wasn't a synagogue member. She was with her throughout her illness, and we had her funeral here at Temple. Temple has always been there for us, and it's been a huge part of our lives. We feel so grateful."

It is that sense of gratitude that led them to leave a legacy gift to Temple in their estate plans. "We knew it was something we wanted to do," they say. "It is so important that there always be opportunities available for those who want to express their Judaism, to be part of a community. Temple has been so good to us—we feel so lucky, so fortunate to have been part of it. So, of course we want to give back."

CAMP TEKO CONSTRUCTION

If you have driven by Camp TEKO in recent months, you will notice that it looks very different these days. The Campaign for Camp TEKO is well underway, with nearly \$11 million raised toward our goal of \$12.8 million.

"It is so exciting to see this project come to life," says Rabbi Zimmerman. "For over 60 years, generations of community members have experienced Jewish life and built lifelong friendships at Camp TEKO. Now, present and future generations will be able to experience this very special place in a whole new

The new buildings at Camp TEKO feature a low carbon footprint. TEKO's Discovery Center, which will serve as the central hub for programming, will feature solar panels, as well as 10 miles of underground piping to provide geothermal heating and cooling. It will also feature a Teaching Kitchen, where campers and visitors can learn about Jewish cooking hands-on, a safety and security space that can house the entire camp community, and a spacious, open area that can be used for programming as well as life cycle events. Special gardens throughout camp will collect rainwater and snow from paved surfaces like pathways, sidewalks, and our parking lot, as well as rooftops and other areas. These gardens hold the water so that it can slowly soak back into the ground as plants, mulch, and soil naturally remove pollutants that would otherwise flow out to Lake Minnetonka.





Rabbi Jason Klein, Director of Lifelong Learning, reflects on the importance of passing the value of caring for our environment to young learners: "The Torah's creation story in seven days gives humanity the responsibility not only to populate, but to 'have dominion' over the earth," he explains. "Soon, not only will TEKO be more sustainable, but our campers will live our Jewish values by harnessing science and asking good questions to raise our awareness and decrease our footprint, to move from having 'power over' the earth to the 'power to' be responsible stewards for future generations."

Camp TEKO is a place where campers not only learn how to live Jewish values, but make lifelong friendships and cultivate pride in their Jewish identity. "I was raised on Jewish camping due to my parents' efforts in founding and supporting Herzl Camp," says Major Gifts Officer, Jerry Waldman, who has led the fundraising for the Campaign for Camp TEKO. "It is clear to me that Jewish camping has been and will continue to be a major factor in producing our community leaders and supporters, now and into the future. Helping TEKO raise the dollars needed to rebuild and improve its facilities seems like a perfect way for all of us to pay it forward for our future generations."

Gifts from Your IRA

If you are age $70^{1}/_{2}$ or older, you may make gifts totaling up to \$100,000 each year to registered charities, tax-free. These qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) qualify toward satisfying your required minimum distribution for the year. QCDs do not require that you itemize, which means that you may decide to take advantage of the higher standard deduction but still use a QCD for charitable giving. By reducing your IRA balance, a QCD may also reduce your taxable income in future years, lowering your taxable estate and limiting your beneficiaries' tax liability. Please consult your tax advisor.
