RABBI HARTMAN

As I write this HaKol article, the days are progressively getting shorter and shorter, darker and darker, colder and colder. We are grateful that the celebration of Chanukah brings light into our lives just when we need it! With the focus on Chanukah presents, Chanukah parties, Chanukah latkes and sufganiyot (jelly doughnuts), we often push aside the miracle of this holiday. Maybe that is by design. In our modern, fast-paced, research-based lives, it is hard to believe the stories of miracles that are so pervasive in Jewish tradition. This gives us trouble when confronted with Chanukah. We don't want our children to focus on the battle that occurred between the Maccabees and the Greek-Syrian army. We definitely don't want to teach our young ones the story of

infighting between Jewish communities that occurred at that time. We ourselves are not sure we believe the miracle of one little bit of oil lasting for the eight days the Maccabees needed to rededicate the Temple after it was defiled.

American-Israeli leader and philosopher Rabbi David Hartman (no relation) presents us with a different paradigm by which to examine the miracle of Chanukah. He questions which miracle we are actually celebrating with the lighting of the Chanukiyah. According to the Books of the Maccabees, books that are not part of the Hebrew Bible, the miracle is the military victory over the Greek-Syrian army. According to these books, Chanukah is eight days because it is a delayed celebration of Sukkot. It is the Talmud, the book of Jewish laws, that teaches us about the miracle of the oil. Yet, for Rabbi David Hartman this is not a satisfying answer to the question of the length of Chanukah. He teaches that if there was enough oil to light the lamp for one day, then there is no miracle on that first day. So Chanukah ought to be a seven day holiday. But we celebrate eight days. Clearly there must be another miracle here, which includes that first day. For Rabbi David Hartman, the miracle was not that the oil lasted an additional seven days, but rather that those ancestors lit the first wick at all, without being certain that the light would last long enough to be used for the rededication of the Temple.

In the dark, cold days of winter, Chanukah not only brings us a time of light and joy, it also reminds us of the importance of taking that first step. It takes faith and courage to begin something without knowing how it will end, whether we are preparing to embark on a new endeavor, or are summoning the strength to rise up after tragedy. These first acts of faith are often the first steps of a miracle. My hope for all of us, as we take in the light of the Chanukah candles, is to recognize the true miracles of our lives—those first small steps that allow us to embark in new directions at pivotal moments.

The modern home celebration of Chanukah centers around the lighting of the chanukiyah, a special menorah for Chanukah; foods prepared in oil including latkes (potato pancakes) and sufganiyot (jelly doughnuts); and special songs and games. 
Merik Francis Schaefer December 2, 2017

GIVING AS AN ACT OF FAITH

TWO GENERATIONS – ONE SHARED COMMITMENT TO LEGACY GIVING by Doug Nathan

As an interfaith couple who raised their three daughters to honor both their Jewish and Catholic heritages, Nancy & Joel Shinder believe that Temple Israel's legacy is its ability to change with the times.

"We are particularly interested in creative ways to engage young people and young families," Nancy said. "There must be a willingness to change and adapt."

This perspective was behind their motivation to help fund Temple's live streaming of services and to subsidize the young people's membership program. It was also a factor when it came to planning their legacy gift for Temple Israel.

With the help and encouragement of daughter Juliana Sellers, who manages the Twin Cities Jewish community's IT'S YOUR LEGACY Program, the Shinders' legacy gift "is the means by which Temple can adapt and grow to respond to the changing needs of the congregation in the future," Nancy said.

"A legacy gift is an act of faith," Joel said. "You are giving to the financial needs of Temple in a future you may not see."

The Shinders are giving their legacy gift to Temple now by setting up a named endowment, which will support the congregation in perpetuity.


