From the Board of Directors Anthony Sussman, President



Dear Friends.

In my last letter to you, I shared my deep sorrow over the acts of terror targeting Israel on October 7, 2023. We continue to grieve the loss of all civilian life-Israeli and Palestinian-in this war and pray for the safe return of the Israeli hostages. I continue to be dismayed at the alarming increase in antisemitism locally, nationally, and globally. Sadly, Temple Israel has been the target of several acts of antisemitism intended to keep us away from our center of community, worship, and learning. I remain grateful

for Temple's dedicated security team, for our clergy and staff who work so hard every day to keep Temple vital and strong, and to you, our congregants, for supporting the essential safety and security work through the Annual Fund and through your annual security commitment.

As we work toward combating antisemitism, I am proud to share that Rabbi Zimmerman, Rabbi Moss, and several Temple Israel congregants joined the March for Israel on the National Mall in Washington, D.C., on November 14. Our delegation added their voices to those of nearly 300,000 who gathered in support of Israel. We are grateful to the Minneapolis Jewish Federation for sponsoring this trip.

I would also like to take a moment to thank all who responded to Temple's annual congregational survey that was sent out after Yom Kippur. Your feedback helps shape the future of Temple Israel and guides our clergy and staff.

We collected feedback on communications, and I am pleased to hear that you are enjoying the new HaKol design. I am also delighted to share that Temple recently hired a dynamic Communications Director–Rabbi Jason Rodich, who grew up here at Temple. Rabbi Rodich is working with our staff to implement some of the changes you suggested in our survey.

Finally I would like to wish each of you a joyus Purim and Passover.

Pack Away Hunger

Over 200 Temple Members Pack Food and Supplies for Those in Need

On the Wednesday before Thanksgiving, in partnership with the National Council of Jewish Women, Temple Israel hosted Pack Away Hunger, another milestone in our longstanding commitment to social justice and tikkun olam. The brainchild of sisters and Temple members Julie Burton and Natalie Shermeta, Pack Away Hunger was supported through a fund they established to honor their parents, by continuing their legacy.

When asked about the event, the sisters shared: "Natalie and I and our families loved participating in the Meals on Wheels program that Anne and Alan Wolf started in memory of their son Stephan. We approached Rabbi Zimmerman and the Temple staff to find out if we could revitalize a family and community-centered Thanksgiving program that would address some of the food insecurity needs of the Twin Cities community, and Pack Away Hunger was created!"

The event, held on November 22, was a vibrant demonstration of putting our Jewish values into action, with over 200 participants joining forces to tackle food insecurity in the Twin Cities. We are proud of what we accomplished!

Pack Away Hunger Temple Israel:

- Prepared 250 bags of food for local food shelves
- Assembled 300 dignity bags for those in need on the streets
- Assembled over 550 personal hygiene kits for high school students and shelters
- Crafted 10 blankets for residents of shelters
- Wrote 40 letters to lone soldiers in Israel
- Composed 25 letters to legislators, advocating for policies to address food insecurity



Rabbi Ricky Kamil, reflecting on Pack Away Hunger's significance, said, "At Temple Israel, we express our Judaism through justice. During a time of great thanks, we also recognize our duty to help our communities. It was inspiring to witness the community's

enthusiasm in helping pack away hunger and building relationships with organizations in need in the Twin Cities."

Julie and Natalie were delighted with the event, sharing, "We were so thrilled and grateful for the strong turnout this year! We are also very grateful to our parents, Joanne and Michael Silverman, who have instilled in us the values of tzedakah and tikkun olam and who also helped make this program possible."

Pack Away Hunger not only provided essential aid to those in need but also brought us together as a Temple community around our shared Jewish values. The lobby was abuzz with the energy of Temple members of all ages coming together to do the mitzvah of helping others. Temple is grateful to Julie, Natalie, and all those who participated for making such an important and community-centered event happen.

His previous government positions include that of attorney with the Atomic Energy Commission, Legislative Aide to former Congressman John Brademas, and Special Assistant to the U.S. Education Commissioner Harold Howe.

U of M Center for Jewish Studies Community Lecture Feeling Jewish: Nostalgia and American Jewish Religion Rachel B. Gross, PhD., San Francisco State University Wednesday, March 27, 7:30 p.m. Temple Israel

American Jews tell stories about who they are and where they come from through a range of everyday objects and supposedly secular organizations. In her book *Beyond the Synagogue: Jewish Nostalgia as Religious Practice*, religious studies professor Rachel B. Gross examines the longing of many American Jews for Eastern European heritage expressed through artisanal delis, children's books and dolls, historic synagogues, and Jewish genealogy. She argues that these nostalgic activities should be understood as religious practices, illuminating how many American Jews are finding and making meaning within American Judaism today. Because not all of that Jewish world is Ashkenazi, this analysis also provides tools for identifying the challenges in embracing the diversity within American Judaism.

Rachel B. Gross is Associate Professor and

John and Marcia Goldman Chair in American Jewish Studies in the Department of Jewish Studies at San Francisco State University. She is a religious studies scholar who studies 20th and 21st century American Jews. Her book, *Beyond the Synagogue*, was a 2021 National Jewish Book Award finalist in American Jewish Studies

American Jewish Studies and received an Honorable Mention for the 2021 Saul Viener Book Prize, given by the American Jewish Historical Society. She is currently working on a religious biography of the 20th century Jewish writer Mary Antin.



Temple Clergy Share Passover Memories

Rabbi Moss: During the first Passover of the pandemic, my sister and I wanted to connect with our grandmother Ruth but could not join her for an in-person seder. What's the next best thing? We connected with her on Zoom so she could teach us how to make matzah balls using all her tips and tricks, such as dabbing them with cold water while you're forming them into shape. She has since passed away, and that video is now a precious memory of her food and her love.

Cantor Sharett-Singer: Passover is our favorite holiday. Growing up in Israel I fondly remember our huge seders with hundreds of people from my big Sharett family. We sang in harmony and played many instruments, and the children always stood on chairs during Ma Nishtana. During Echad Eloheinu, our favorite song concluding the seder, we would all sing and tap loudly on the table and my grandfather, Ya'acov Sharett ^{z⁷}, would always hit the cymbals at the end of each verse which made us all laugh very hard. It is our favorite memory of Passover. Today, we keep the tradition alive with keeping all of our special melodies and traditions, and the kids always enjoy standing on chairs!



Rabbi Zimmerman: I was welcomed into the Hornstein family around their unique seder traditions. They sing all the prayers and Hallel in Hungarian melodies. The most profound legacy is sharing stories of liberation during the meal. Dr. Anna Ornstein shared her personal Holocaust stories of resilience and survival. Each of the Ornstein/Hornstein children tell their own annual liberation stories. I have shared some of the stories Anna shared around the seder table. They teach us timeless lessons.

Rabbi Hartman: Passover was my maternal grandparents' holiday. In fact, my family would joke that there were three seasons in their house—pre-Passover, Passover, and post-Passover. My grandmother would change over her kitchen to kosher for Passover dishes months before Passover started. She needed this time to make the dozens upon dozens of popover muffins our family would consume. My grandfather would spend this time pouring over haggadot and teachings about the holiday to ensure each person was given the perfect reading. When Passover began, children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, and siblings would all descend on their house filling the table with 30-40 relatives. We read and sang and ate and celebrated together. While my grandparents are no longer living, their legacy remains in the lively seders their children and grandchildren lead around their own tables.

Ahad Ha'am, the founder of cultural Zionism, once said, "More than the Jewish People have kept Shabbat, Shabbat has kept the Jews." Throughout Jewish time, the sacred center of Shabbat and holidays has been not only the synagogue, but also the Shabbat table where we sit with loved ones and are nourished. We are even taught that for Jews, our dinner table is a *mikdαsh me'αt*, a miniature temple. Whether your Shabbat meal is chicken, pizza, cholent, vegan stew, dafina, your favorite delivery, or a nice dinner out in the North Loop, food is central to the ethos of Shabbat: community, rest, and recharge. Judaism teaches that Shabbat gives us a taste of the world to come, the world in its most ideal state. The food of Shabbat can make this metaphor a reality.



TEMPLE IS LEED GOLD CERTIFIED!

Temple Israel extends its profound gratitude to Melissa for her ongoing leadership to help achieve this important milestone.

Temple Israel is thrilled to announce that its almost 100-year-old campus is officially LEED Gold Certified

Since 2019, Temple Israel has been pursuing LEED Certification for its historic Emerson campus as part of the board-approved strategic plan and sustainability goals.

What is LEED?

LEED, an acronym for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design, is a holistic green building rating system that encompasses best practices in energy, water, materials and waste, landscaping/site, indoor environmental quality, and location. Its point-based system was developed by the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) in the 1990s to address the impact buildings have on our health and our environment.

How did Temple score?

To get LEED Certified, a project needs to comply with all seven prerequisites and earn at least 40 points. Earning 50+ points gets you Silver, 60+ is Gold, and 80+ points gets you to the highest level of Platinum certification. Temple Israel earned 67 points, achieving LEED Gold. Here are the categories and details:

Temple Israel has upgraded all its lighting to LED, which financially paid for itself in about one year and extends the life of the bulbs. Additionally, Temple implemented several energy conservation opportunities identified by a recommissioning study conducted in 2019. These initiatives also help Temple decrease its carbon footprint (another sustainability goal).

MATERIALS & RESOURCES

AWARDED 8/9

Temple Israel diverts a significant amount of trash through weekly recycling and composting pickups; Temple Israel also recycles all of its e-waste. Additionally, Temple Israel has adopted a Sustainable Purchasing Policy for all ongoing and event-related purchases.

INDOOR ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY

AWARDED 18/22

These points stem primarily from high occupancy satisfaction (employees are comfortable working in these spaces) and healthy indoor air. Temple Israel has also adopted green cleaning and integrated pest management policies.

Due to Temple Israel's convenient location, many people walk, ride their bikes, take public transportation, work from home, or drive an electric or hybrid car. These activities add up to a lower carbon footprint compared to typical single-passenger vehicles driving to work daily.

So, what's the big deal?

While a handful of synagogues have LEED Certified newly-constructed buildings, Temple Israel is the **first synagogue in the world** to achieve LEED certification for an existing building. Most buildings are already existing, so to move the needle towards more efficient and healthier buildings, focusing on existing buildings makes sense. This achievement exemplifies Temple Israel's commitment to sustainability. Cheers to Temple for LEEDing the way!

What's next?

LEED Certification is not a one-and-done endeavor (recertification is required every five years). Temple Israel will continue monitoring its energy and water usage, trash diversion rates, purchases, indoor air quality, and more.



A Lifetime of Giving Back



Judy Karon has been a member of Temple for over 50 years—a familiar presence on boards and committees, in adult learning classes and on congregational trips, and of course, in our sanctuary, attending Shabbat and festival services.

Her connection to progressive Judaism goes back many years—her family was active at the Reform congregation in Duluth, Temple Emanuel. She joined Temple Israel as a young adult, "for the same reason I belong today—Temple is a Reform congregation in the city, focused on interfaith relationships and with so many opportunities for connection and personal growth. Through Temple, I have made lifelong friends with whom I have learned and traveled over the years," Judy says.

Judy loves to travel and has taken part in four congregational trips. One that stands out in her mind is a trip to Eastern Europe and Rome, led in 2000 by Rabbi Edelheit and (former) Father Michael O'Connell of the Basilica. "Half of the 40 participants were from Temple, and half from the Basilica," she remembers. "We focused on the Jewish and Catholic experiences, and learned that there were many similarities in our values. While our practices may differ, we both center tzedakah, righteous giving, and tikkun olam, caring for those in need." Judy's parents taught her the importance of these values from a young age, encouraging her to be active in her community. Judy has served on the Temple board and currently serves on the Foundation board. She also served on past rabbinic search committees and task forces.

"Any part of yourself that you can give to your community is so important," she explains. "Temple has given so much to me, has made an incredible impact on my life, so I want to give back. Giving, caring, being open to new ideas, learning-there's no end to the opportunities we have at Temple to carry out these values. I've learned so much here-about Jewish history, about art and music, about social topics like gay marriage and interfaith marriage. Those are ideas that most people in my age category weren't exposed to until the 1960s or 70s. There's no end to what you can learn, and someone has to support that. 
