

CLERGY VOICE

Dear Friends,

As 2018 ends, we are sober in the aftermath of the Pittsburgh shooting at Congregation Etz Chaim that killed 11 Jews. Despite these challenging times, our spiritual convictions call us to deepen our relationships with friends and allies and, where possible, with those with whom we disagree.

Ecclesiastes reminds us, "There is nothing new under the sun." The human drives for connection and competition remain, even if they are communicated in new ways. And so our ancient tradition has much to say about our present circumstances.

The Torah teaches us: "When you see the ox of your enemy lying under its burden and would refrain from raising it, you must nevertheless raise it with them." We are instructed to not give in to our impulses, but rise above them to be just, fair, and generous even when our inclination is different.

Building relationships does not mean Kumbaya - those we are in relationship with won't agree all the time. Our goal, instead, should be to establish trusting relationships across our differences to lean into the places where we agree and disagree alike. By doing this, we can make sure that no one leaves the table, but that we work out our differences because the relationship is what matters. Through relationships, we can work together to build a tomorrow for the common good and for a country and world of which we can all be proud.

In this spirit, I recently traveled to Washington, D.C. at the invitation of Senator Amy Klobuchar to join a roundtable on combating hate. Senator Klobuchar wanted to showcase our interfaith work and the consistent media spotlight our work receives, including last year's Super Bowl video. In addition, I was invited to join the transition advisory board for Governor-elect Tim Walz and Lieutenant Governor-elect Peggy Flanagan, who are seeking diverse voices to help establish the groundwork for a strong future in Minnesota. For Temple Israel, some of the most compelling work is helping to create a powerful and positive vision for our city, and so the senior clergy of the interfaith partner congregations are embarking on a plan to put religion at the forefront of finding solutions to the complex realities of the 21st century.

I urge you, with the fresh optimism of a new calendar year, to reach out to those with whom you disagree. In this way, strangers can become neighbors. Adversaries can find common cause. And the goodwill we share as members of the human race can carry us toward a greater understanding of each other, and a greater peace.





IT'S YOUR LEGACY is a collaborative endowment program that benefits Jewish organizations across the country, created in partnership with the Harold Grinspoon Foundation. The program allows the Jewish community to work together to secure a lasting and vital Jewish future. Through our partnership with the Grinspoon Foundation and the Jewish Federation of Minneapolis, Temple Israel is achieving our planned giving goals. Nationally, the program has helped secure more than 15,000 legacy commitments, with an estimated value of over three quarters of a billion dollars in planned gifts to the Jewish community.

Over the past six years, The Temple Israel Foundation endowment has more than doubled—to over \$12 million. This remarkable growth comes from the sustaining generosity and shared vision of our congregants, the commitment and dedication of our Foundation Board members, and our participation in the It's Your Legacy Program. We have been an active participant in the program since its inception. In this short time, we have received two grants totaling \$15,000 from It's Your Legacy for This year the Temple Israel Foundation contributed \$500,000, or 7.4%, towards our \$6.7 million budget.

THE OREN & SHARRON STEINFELDT FOUNDATION

We are grateful to the Oren & Sharron Steinfeldt Foundation for continuing to support Jewish education here at Temple Israel. Through a generous grant of \$15,000, the Foundation provides funding for our JEWL (Jewish Experiential Whole-person Learning) program, serving learners in Kindergarten through the 10th grade.

The grant jointly supports scholastic aid for families in need of tuition assistance, as well as overall support for the JEWL program, including curriculum development, professional development for faculty and staff, and more.

Like all synagogue religious schools, income from tuition does not cover all of the fees necessary to operate our school-it

covers approximately 65% of operating costs. The remaining amount is covered by generous grants from funders like the Steinfeldt Foundation, the Minneapolis Jewish Federation, and the Tankenoff Families Foundation. Further support comes from our congregants, through the Annual Fund for Temple Israel. Providing every child with a Jewish education is one of our highest priorities, and no family is ever turned away from JEWL because of an inability to pay.

IMMIGRATION JUSTICE AT TEMPLE

In 2018, Temple Israel's Board of Directors passed a resolution endorsing Temple's commitment to Immigration Justice, envisioning a program of education, advocacy, and action in support of immigrants and refugees. This might include providing sanctuary to a family or individuals who may be facing deportation. This issue directly affects our Temple family, including congregants and staff. We feel compelled by our families, our faith, and our history to help through action, and as an organization, we are well-equipped to assist those in need. The most repeated of any law in the Torah (some 35 separate instances) is the admonition to protect the stranger in your midst. The book of Leviticus instructs: "When strangers sojourn in your land, you shall not do them wrong. They shall be to you as the natives among you, and you shall love them as yourself, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt" (19:33-34).

Sanctuary would mean that Temple would house an individual or family while they are pursuing their right to remain in the U.S. through immigration courts. Individuals staying at Temple would be known to the Temple community and screened and approved by Temple's leadership. Under our government's policy on sensitive locations, immigrants who seek protection inside houses of worship have a measure of safety.

Volunteers will be critical in our effort to house people at Temple - staying overnight, providing food and other assistance, and helping cover additional costs (making the monetary impact on Temple minimal). Temple Israel may also choose to support other Sanctuary Congregations by providing food, clothing, and volunteers, and will look to other supportive congregations for volunteer assistance.

In addition to the sanctuary-related activities, during the coming year, Temple will engage in an education program around immigration and refugee issues. There will also be opportunities to advocate for issues around immigration justice.

Throughout history, we, as Jews, have endured persecution and wandered in search of a new home and safe haven. Today, with the benefit of the freedoms offered to us by the United States, it is our turn to stand up to afford others due process while advocating for fair and just immigration policies and legislation.
