Each member of our clergy team adds distinct contributions to Temple, and all of us work together to serve our congregation and community on your behalf.

As Senior Rabbi, I work with our Board of Directors to set the vision for Temple Israel and lead our clergy and staff. In addition to these permanent clergy members, we look forward to welcoming **Cantor Hayley Kobilinsky** to Temple Israel during this year's High Holy Days, where her voice will add to our celebrations and reflections.

Mary Johnson-Roy is the founder of "From Death to Life," an organization dedicated to ending violence through facilitating healing and reconciliation between families on both sides of the tragedy of homicide.

Through participation in the restorative justice process,

Mary transformed the anger and hatred she had for Oshea Israel, the then-16-year-old who took her son's life, into forgiveness and love. When Oshea was released from prison in 2010 after serving 17 years, Mary welcomed him home with open arms. She now considers him her "spiritual son" and together, they share their powerful story of healing and reconciliation around the country.

Interested in learning Hebrew? If you've never had the opportunity before or need a refresher, come and learn the basics of letter recognition and reading. Already know how to read Hebrew? If you have basic Hebrew reading skills, this class will reinforce them and focus on understanding the prayers and their meaning and place in the service. Ability to read the Hebrew aleph-bet is required.

Conversational Hebrew and Israeli Culture

Tuesdays, September 10 – May 12, 7:15 – 8:15 p.m.

Instructor: Ben Bitton | Fee: \$450 (includes books and materials)

For those who have mastered basic Hebrew reading and want to engage in conversational Hebrew, this class is for you! This course offers the chance to build your Hebrew vocabulary and grammar, put them into day-to-day use through practice, and be exposed to Israel's culture through fun and engaging activities with their Israeli teacher. Ability to read the Hebrew aleph-bet is required.

Anshei Mitzvah: The Adult B'nai Mitzvah Class

This class and life cycle ceremony is offered to our Temple Israel members every few years and provides Jewish learners the opportunity to learn the skills and have the experience of leading worship and reading Torah. Ability to read the Hebrew aleph-bet is required.

Introduction to Judaism

Tuesday evenings, September – May

Instructors: Temple Israel Clergy and Shiri Cooks, Hebrew Instructor

This class is for those who want to refresh their Judaic knowledge, are considering conversion to Judaism, or are interested in discovering more about the foundations of Judaism. This class covers the history, values, texts, rituals, and philosophies that have shaped Judaism and introduces the Hebrew alphabet and basic Hebrew vocabulary associated with Jewish life.

An introductory meeting with one of our clergy is required prior to enrolling in this class.

Kabbalah Sparks

Immersing in the Kabbalah: Back to the Basics of Jewish Mysticism.

Fourth Tuesday of the month starting in October, 7:00 – 9:00 p.m.

Instructor: Rabbi Glaser

This is the second year of a two-year curriculum that immerses the student in the mysteries and mind-bending theologies and philosophies of Jewish Mysticism. Subject areas include the eternal nature of God, the sefirot, the Zohar, Lurianic thought, the problem of evil, the origins of Kabbalah in the Bible, sexuality, Messianism, Hasidism, the Hebrew aleph-bet, sin and repentance, and quite a bit more. We recommend that you purchase *A Kabbalah and Jewish Mysticism Reader* by Daniel Horwitz. You are welcome to attend any single class or the entire series.

Explore the World of Mussar!

Fee per person (includes materials) \$72. Space is limited.

Mussar, a Jewish spiritual pathway, explores personal characteristics, called middot, that each of us has in different measure. Through working on our development and awareness of these soul traits, each of us learns how to respond to the world in ways that help bring about greater peace, compassion, understanding, and joy. Join a group of 8-12 people to learn, study, and practice Mussar led by a trained facilitator.

TORAH HOTDISH

LIFELONG LEARNING AT TEMPLE ISRAEL

Since our earliest days as a people, life in temporary places has been a hallmark of Jewish life. Camping is associated with our most sacred stories, such as when the Israelites left Egypt and camped at the foot of Mount Sinai, and then in the wilderness for 40 years on the way to the Land of Israel. In fact, thousands of years ago, the festival of Sukkot at the end of the harvest season may have been the most important holiday on the Jewish calendar. Its call to live outdoors for a week in the fall reminds us that we are vulnerable, yet we feel a sense of protection; the Sukkah itself is fragile, but it is still a shelter.

The tension between protection and vulnerability frames Jewish camping today. Jewish summer camping trends toward curricula of *middot*, character traits, and our own Camp TEKO likes to talk about the *midah* of *Zerizut*, which we interpret as zeal—the enthusiasm to seize on an opportunity to try something new, to push ourselves, to grow. As safety allows people to push themselves beyond their comfort zones, we want our campers to feel safe. Zeal begins with staff members who are models of growth in learning and leadership, and make the space for our campers to be transported to a magical place while they are at TEKO. In this way, we hope that campers may be transformed by the milestones of their personal growth.

Kol Ha'kavod to Abby Kirshbaum, who completed her first cycle as Director of TEKO, joined by an enthusiastic team of senior leadership, *madrichim* (counselors), and *mumchim* (specialists). Abby piloted an instructional swim program in partnership with the Starfish Aquatics Institute, and Gesher, a short overnight

experience for seventh and eighth graders who are between the TEKO camper years and leadership training high school years.

Beyond Lake Minnetonka, Temple Israel likes to send small gifts to groups of campers who are away from home during the summer. Early in the summer, Rachel Sher, our Youth Educator and Program Coordinator,

visited many of Temple's campers at Herzl Camp, and Rabbis Hartman and Moss returned to Herzl to see our campers later in the summer. Temple Israel also continues to deepen our relationship with OSRUI, our Reform movement summer camp in Oconomowoc, WI. I was warmly welcomed to OSRUI for July 4 weekend, visited our campers, and learned firsthand about the variety of programs available there. We have some scholarships available for the next two summers for first-time four week campers at OSRUI going into third grade and beyond, so please let me know if you might want more information for your children or grandchildren.

Though camp season may seem to be winding down, if you're exploring options for a family getaway over MEA weekend, I invite you to explore OSRUI's family camp. There is more information at osrui.org. Temple Israel is discounting the registration fee to make this experience during Sukkot as easy as possible to consider for your family.

SUSTAINABILITY NOW

WHAT IS A “SUSTAINABLE” CAMP TEKO?

In last month’s HaKol, we introduced Temple’s new sustainability goals that were adopted by the Board of Directors in early 2019. These goals are part of our strategic plan to “integrate sustainability and its practice across all Temple Israel facilities, programming, education, planning, and operations:” Net Zero Carbon Emissions and Net Zero Waste by 2030. Of course, this includes Camp TEKO, an ideal site to not only incorporate sustainable practices into facility upgrades, but to also demonstrate and experience some components of sustainability that might be more feasible with a large outdoor setting.

But what does this really mean? Is a “sustainable” camp one that grows and consumes all its own organic food, relies entirely on its own energy produced by renewable resources, composts all food waste, contributes zero waste to landfills, uses a gray water system and composting toilets, manages all storm water runoff, grows pollinator-friendly gardens, uses no cleaning or landscaping chemicals, and does not pollute Lake Minnetonka? This list of ideal—yet perhaps only partially attainable—goals can go on and on, but we need to start with a dose of reality, time, and budget constraints. Where do we draw the lines? What are the most important items?

As with any sustainability initiative, there are financial no-brainers, like using environmentally-friendly paints, low-flush plumbing fixtures, and LED lighting. But in creating the broader vision, we can focus on our two aspirational goals: energy and waste.



ENERGY / CARBON EMISSIONS

We want to get TEKO to a point where no fossil fuels are burned for the energy needed at the camp, so all appliances (stoves, heaters, water heating, etc.) need to be powered by electricity instead of natural gas. As the electric grid itself becomes cleaner (Xcel Energy is already 25% renewable), and producing solar on-site is a

possibility, electrifying facilities makes sense. Energy efficiency is also part of the equation. In addition, as part of our transformation to a clean energy economy, transportation is migrating towards electric too, which means electric cars, buses, and lawnmowers—so let’s plan for charging stations in the parking lot. Even if we can’t invest in solar now, new buildings can be planned to be “solar ready,” avoiding costs down the road.

WASTE

Similar to what we are doing at the Emerson Avenue campus, reducing our waste starts with looking at our purchases—in addition to conducting a waste audit to better understand our waste. For example, are campers bringing single-use packaged items that cannot be recycled in their lunches? How do we reduce that kind of waste, which might seem to be beyond our control? Like our energy goals, the goal of getting to zero waste requires planning and communication.

RESILIENCY

The idea of sustainability assumes the status quo. Unfortunately, the problem is that our world is anything but status quo. The term “resiliency” recognizes the new realities and addresses how organizations can plan for—and recover from—things like extreme weather events, natural and man-made disasters, and security risks. Do we need a resilient camp? Indeed we do—so durable buildings are essential. Does that mean we have back-up power in the event of a power failure? We’ll explore that as an option as well.

As we embark on upgrading TEKO’s facilities, these are some of the issues that will be under discussion, and we are asking for input from TEKO staff, campers, and Temple members. Please call or email communications@templeisrael.com if you would like to contribute your ideas.

TALMUD TODAY

TRACTATE TI 4A

RABBI KLEIN SAYS

Every mezuzah scroll in the world contains the same verses of the Shema, yet there is a myriad of designs for the box that contains the words. And every time we hang a mezuzah on a doorpost, it is traditional to say a blessing that ends with the words likbo'a mezuzah, acknowledging that the Holy One commands us to affix a mezuzah.

Every human being in the world contains the same cells, tissues, and organs, yet not only is each of our physical appearances different, but our thoughts, our deeds, our characters, and our abilities vary infinitely across culture, time, and space. How appropriate, then, that we human beings should strive to be blessings to one another.

RABBI GLASER SAYS

Who is wise? Asked the Rabbis. And they answered: The one who learns from everyone. I recall a torrential rain one late afternoon outside the door of my former pulpit. As I pondered how to navigate my way to my car I cursed the rain out loud. I felt a tap on my shoulder as Bunny, our Jamaican-born custodian, chuckled and gently reminded me: "Rabbi, the rain is a blessing." I have never forgotten that. And I haven't cursed the rain since.



It was the favorite saying of the sages of Yavneh: I am a creature of God and you are a creature of God. My work may be in the city, yours is perhaps in the field. As you rise early to your work, so I rise early to my work. As you do not claim that your work is superior to mine, so I do not claim that mine is superior to yours. And should one say, I do more important work and the other less important work, we have already learned: more or less, it does not matter, so long as the heart is turned toward heaven.

RABBI MOSS SAYS

Rise and shine, and give God your glory, glory! Is this the rabbinic precursor to that well-known ditty?! After all, the sages here say that what matters is that you rise early to your work with your heart turned towards heaven. In the Torah, there is a single word that encapsulates this entire notion: hishkim. There are examples in which Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and Moses each rise early in the morning and immediately do some form of useful work that serves a divine purpose. Two of Moses' "Let my people go!" moments are accompanied by this verb. We, too, can rise early to do our part in bringing freedom and justice to our world.

RABBI HARTMAN SAYS

Each of us contributes to our community and our world in individual, unique ways, and the ways in which we do are all equally important in the eyes of God. As we enter this season of self-reflection, we have the opportunity to look into our souls to make sure we are working together to improve our world for the next generation. When we do this, let us recognize that our differences help us complement each other, and let us turn our hearts, always, toward God.




It's difficult to believe that summer 2019 is over. We have seen your campers try new things, make new friends, and sing their hearts out. We have seen them face challenges and learn the skills to help them make it through. We have seen them make friendship bracelets, kayak for the first time, and sing *birkat hamazon*. We have seen them make connections to each other, to their counselors, and to Judaism.

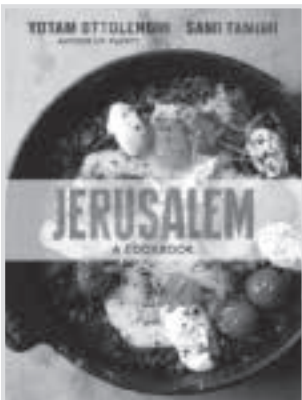
